Accordingly, he may pass and hear West bid 1NT on his left. North will imagine that the hand belongs to his opponents. Some will overcall 2♠ and some 3♠, and in either case East will be shut out of the auction and South will look towards game.</p> <p>As the cards lie, there are four losers in a spade contract and easy top tricks in 3NT – whichever red suit is led provides the ninth.</p> <p>Opposite a simple 2♠ overcall, South may well jump to 3NT or, more subtly, cuebid 3♥ then bid 3NT over 3♠ to express doubt at so which game should be played. While North will certainly pass a jump to 3NT, if given an option he is more likely to choose the unsuccessful spade game.</p> <p>Facing a 3♠ pre-emptive overcall, South may still bid game, as he has a lot of good cards, but it will be harder for him to bid 3NT as he has less reason to expect good high card values in partner’s hand. It is hard to know – facing ♠KJ10xxxx, there may be four top losers, while 3NT will be hopeless. Any of 3NT, 4♠ and Pass could be the winning call.</p>

West responds 3♣ or better, if playing Lebensohl, bids 2NT, asking partner to bid 3♣. He intends to pass 3♣, of course, but could make the same bid when holding a weak hand with a different suit, the slow route to 3♦ or 3♥ saying exactly that. There are two trump losers in 3♣ so the contract has to fail by a trick.</p> <p>If South passes, East may get to open in fourth seat. I know, the hand contains 15 HCP, but those unsupported queens and lack of tens and nines makes the hand look more like a weak no trump than a strong one to me. I’d probably open 1NT whether playing 15-17 or 12-14. Sacrilege to some, I suppose.</p> <p>A spade lead beats 1NT as the suit is cleared immediately and South has red-suit entries to cash the spades. If South passes as dealer then overcalls 2♠, he will play there and probably make exactly for a very good score.</p>

In 2♥, declarer plays three rounds of hearts immediately, and should make exactly.</p> <p>Where East opens 1♣, he rebids 1NT and may play there or West may rebid 2♦ and get to play in a red suit. East will need to give false preference to the major to score well, as while 2♦ makes +90 is outscored by the +110 available in 2♥.</p> <p>I think most Wests should judge to play in a red suit after East’s 1♣ opening and 1NT rebid. If they choose not to do so, 1NT can be defeated by South’s natural low spade lead and a minus score should be very poor for E/W.</p> <p>And finally, what if East opens 1♠ and West responds 1NT, where he plays. Now North will lead the jack of clubs. The defence should still have time to switch their attention to spades and once again the contract will be defeated.</p>

CLUB STRATIFIED SIM PAIRS

Welcome to the third 'Club Stratified Sim Pairs'.
Our commentator today is Brian Senior, bridge author, newspaper columnist and player.

You may wonder how the stratification works and which strat you are in. There are four categories of strats. The main strat 'A' is open to everyone but if either member of the pair is a Tournament Master or above you will be in the 'A' strat and can only get master points from the overall ranking. If both of you are below the rank of Tournament Master you will be 'B' strat; both below Master means you will be in 'C' strat and both below District Master will make you 'D' strat.

Blue points and local points will be awarded to the top third of the overall ranking list. In addition the top third of each strat will get blue points and local points.

If you are entitled to overall points and points for your strat, you will only get the higher of the awards – you won't get two lots of points.

Master points cannot be allocated until after the event is finalised, usually about three weeks. Please keep your scorecard for that period. If we find any unusual scores we may need to a contact the club scorer and also the players. Full results can be found at www.ebu.co.uk/sims/

Probably the most popular auction will see North open 1NT and South use Stayman then jump to 3NT over the 2♦ response.</p> <p>East will lead a spade. Declarer has seven top tricks and an obvious eighth in diamonds, but the ninth may prove elusive. Playing on clubs rates to mean three club losers to go with the ace of diamonds and a long spade (or two), so declarer is likely to win the spade in hand and play a diamond to the queen then a second diamond to the ten, losing to the jack. The winning play is to win the spade return, cross to hand with a heart, and lead a low diamond, dropping the now bare ace. Thanks to the club blockage, the defence can only get one trick in that suit and declarer scrambles home with nine.</p> <p>On a bad day, this leads to two down, when East has ♦AJ98 and there are also three clubs to be cashed. However, with East showing the spade length, it is worth hoping he has the shorter diamond holding.</p>

In practice, the diamond queen ruffs out so the spade position becomes irrelevant. Playing Acol, South opens 1♥, the middle of three touching four-card suits, and West pre-empts with 3♣. If 4♦ would still be a splinter bid, as is the case for most pairs, this is what North should bid. South may have a lot of strength in diamonds, but he does have very good controls, and the club shortage is particularly encouraging, so he can afford to cuebid 5♦ over East's likely 5♣ sacrifice and North will be able to visualise the club shortage and bid 6♥.</p> <p>It is actually harder if East does not raise clubs. If South cuebids 4♠ over 4♦, it will be hard for North to co-operate when looking at two small clubs, so someone is going to have to make a brave bid – brave is a term used only for successful bids, of course, foolhardy being the normal designation of exactly the same bid when it proves to be unsuccessful.</p>

In either case, East doubles for take-out and South rebids his spades, 2♠ over 1NT, 3♠ (not constructive) over 2♠. Over 2♠, West will be happy to bid 3♥ and now North should compete to 3♠, knowing his partner to hold a 6-card suit for the 2♠ rebid. That should end the auction and make exactly – the defence can get a club ruff but only at the expense of their heart trick, which then disappears on the fourth club.</p> <p>Where South has rebid 3♠, some Wests will pass while some will refuse to be shut out and bid hearts a level higher than they really wanted to do. Bidding 4♥ will work out just fine as, though it goes down, that will be cheaper than defending against the cold 3♠. Yes, double dummy 4♥ can be doubled for down two, but that requires that North lead a low diamond at trick one to set up the ruff – the defensive spade trick is going nowhere. If anyone finds that lead against you rather than the normal spade, they are either crazy or have information about the board that they should not have.</p>

I would not lead from king-empty-to-four into a strong no trump, preferring to lead either minor.</p> <p>A club is the killer, but even a diamond does no real harm and avoids giving away a trick.</p> <p>The play is very awkward in 1NT. Declarer may cross to the ace of hearts to take a spade finesse, hoping to find either honour-doubleton or both honours on his right. Today is not his lucky day and the defence is in control – even if South ducked the first diamond, by the time he gets in with the ♠Q North should have an idea that it is time to switch to clubs as declarer seems happy to play on every other suit.</p> <p>If West opens 1♠, East may raise to 2♠ even if playing four-card majors – the weak doubleton suggests this choice of action. South can overcall 3♣ and West may try 3♠, which will usually be correct whenever East has a fourth spade. 3♠ can be beaten but it is easy to see how it might be allowed to succeed, while 3♣ should always be defeated.</p>

West has too much for an immediate raise to 2♠ and not enough for a three-level raise, even if that was played as constructive, so cuebids 2♣, constructive raise to at least 2♠. North may double or may prefer to make the slightly more committal bid of 2♦, showing his 5-4 shape and good values as he is inviting preference to the three level.</p> <p>It is unlikely that South will ever get involved unless forced to do so. East will rebid 2♠ and that may be that.</p> <p>2♠ makes exactly after a club lead, with an overtrick on any other lead, while clubs is held to eight tricks should North compete further.</p> <p>in 3♣, declarer must play three rounds of diamonds immediately to guarantee that he can ruff the fourth round should the suit not split 3-3. As the cards lie that proves to be necessary and he comes to four club tricks, two diamonds, a diamond ruff and the ace of spades, for down one – a good result if nobody doubles.</p>

When West opens 1♥ in third seat, East will respond 2♣ and West rebid 2♥. Some Easts will raise to game now but we all know partners who open a little bit light in third seat, even vulnerable, so perhaps an invitational 3♥ is sufficient. With a sixth heart and good honour combinations, West can go on to game.</div> <div>A spade lead will hold the contract to ten tricks but on a red-suit lead declarer can win and lead the jack of clubs. If that goes to the queen, king and ace, South had better switch to a spade, otherwise declarer takes a ruffing finesse against the club ten and gets two spades away, making 11 tricks.</div> </div>

A weak no trump opening may be passed around to West, and it is normal for him to bid whatever his system dictates on such a hand. The simplest artificial defence to 1NT, Landy, where 2♣ shows both majors, finds the spade fit very easily. East may jump to 3♠ in response, but West is unlikely to go on to game.</div> <div>A 1♣ opening from North may see east overcall 1♠, though the weak suit is a good reason not to come in in my view, and now West may jump all the way to 4♣.</div> <div>Where East passes, South responds 1♥ and West will either overcall 1♠ or double to get both spades and diamonds into the picture. East is worth a jump to 3♠ now and South will compete in clubs.</div> <div>If N/S get to 5♣, going one down, they will be disappointed to have got too high, until they realise that 4♠ is cold for their opponents.</div> </div> </div>

If North overcalls 1♠ East will make a negative double. South has a pre-emptive raise to 3♠ and that silences West. However, when 3♠ comes around, East will double again, and now West can bid 4♥, having limited his hand by the previous pass.</div> <div>Slam is making for E/W, but 6♦/♥ are both against the odds, requiring both that there be only one diamond loser and that declarer pick up the hearts without loss. While someone will no doubt bid and make 6♥ for a huge score, +480 for E/W should be above average as not everyone will get the hearts right.</div> </div> </div>

Having said that the North hand on the previous deal was a routine 2♥ opener, what about East on this deal, at favourable vulnerability? East may have zero HCP, but he does have a seventh heart.

This may be too rich for many, but I would open 2♥. Feel free to pass while shaking your head about Senior’s insanity if you wish. If East did open 2♥, I would overcall 2NT as South, double with the West hand, and jump to 4♠ as North. Finally, West may double 4♠ and a heart lead for a ruff followed by three rounds of clubs results in three down and a very nice +500 for E/W.

Of course, there will be many different outcomes, whether or not East opens. If South opens 1♦, West overcalls 2♣ and North bids 2♠. South can only rebid 3♦ and North is a bit stuck so bids 3♠. South may judge that there is no game now, hating his three low clubs and weak spade doubleton. If he passes 3♠, he may not score too badly, given what is happening to N/S at other tables around the room.

Unless playing five-card majors, West opens 1♥, the middle of three touching four-card suits. I would make a weak jump overcall of 3♣ as North. With good clubs I would do so even if 6-3-2-2, but here the four-card side-suit adds to the playing strength and increases the likelihood that the opposition have a major-suit contract – all the more reason to pre-empt and make life difficult for them.

If East now stretches to bid 3♥, there is a real danger that West will get over-excited and look for slam. As long as that try is a 3♠ cuebid and he trusts East’s 4♥ sign-off, everything will be OK, but if he just launches into Blackwood he will get too high as ten tricks is the limit on accurate defence.

If East does not bid 3♥, West will make a reopening double. With fewer than four of partner’s bid suit, east might pass for penalties with king-to-four clubs. On his actual hand, however, he will not only remove to hearts, but jump to the heart game.

Having passed over 3♣, four trumps to an honour, a singleton and a well-position king should be enough to give the heart game decent play.

Vulnerability makes cowards of us all. Playing normal style weak two bids, I would not open the West hand when vulnerable. North will therefore get to open 1♠ and N/S bid easily to 4♠. Indeed, I have been in worse slams than this one, which requires the trumps to come in without loss and seven tricks in the minors, with either suit providing four tricks or a possible squeeze.

It wouldn't surprise me to find a few pairs getting to the five- or even six-level, and 5/6♠ is too high – on a diamond lead there is a ruff to hold declarer to ten tricks. Meanwhile, 6♣ is only one down as trumps can be drawn before taking the losing spade finesse.

If South responds 2♣, North may jump to 3♥, splinter agreeing clubs, and South's lack of wasted heart values could easily see him co-operate despite his otherwise mediocre balanced hand. Over 3♥ he will bid 3♠ and if North cuebids 4♣ or 4♦ South will feel that he is too good to sign-off. He has an easy 4♦ over the more likely 4♣.

Unless you use the two-suited weak openings, Lucas Twos or the like, you will normally pass the North hand – though I confess to sometimes opening these hands with 2♥ non-vulnerable even when playing simple weak two bids. East has a normal 3♦ opening, even at this vulnerability.

South has a borderline decision, whether to double or to pass. 14 HCP and some support for all the unbid suits suggests doubling, while the doubleton diamond, lack of either four-card major, and fact that partner is a passed hand, suggest passing. It is close but I suspect that most will double and that gets 4♥ from North, whether or not West raises to 4♦, as he should.

The vulnerability will prevent E/W from going on to 5♦ over 4♥, and 11 tricks can be made in the heart game. Yes, even on a club lead, an obvious singleton, I would take the trump finesse. After the pre-empt, the heart king will be onside far more often than not, and if West has king-doubleton and East three low, playing ace and another heart to try to avoid a club ruff could actually prove to be the only way to concede one.

But a spade lead is more challenging, though 13 tricks are still there on the actual layout.</p> <p>In 6♦, declarer might win the spade lead and play two top hearts for a spade discard then try to crossruff his way to 12 tricks. At most tables South will pass, discounting the bare queen and not liking the lack of intermediates in his long suits. That sees West open 2NT and East raise to game. North has no reason to do other than fish out a heart and that usually goes three, queen and ace, giving declarer four heart tricks and an extra entry to dummy to lead the jack of clubs. However, with only one other sure entry, he will still give up two club tricks and come to 11.

If North leads a small heart rather than the normal top-of-nothing or second from a bad suit, declarer might go wrong by calling for the ten, expecting the queen to be on his left and wanting to ensure a dummy entry for the club play. That costs a heart trick and declarer will be forced to play clubs from hand.

Careful defence now holds the contract to ten tricks for a good score for N/S.

If South opens 1♦, the auction is a little more complicated, but West will double then bid 2NT over the 2♣ response and East should bid game.

The favourable lie of the cards means that E/W can make nine tricks in a heart contract, at least double dummy, but they will surely never get to play there, instead defending against a spade partscore at most tables.

The deal is all about the battle for the ninth trick in spades. Played by South, a club lead sees the defence prevail, taking two club tricks then switching to a trump to prevent the heart ruff. It might seem that a diamond lead to the ace and a trump switch would also be OK for E/W, and that may often prove to be good enough. However, if declarer reads the complex ending just right, he can squeeze then endplay East for the ninth trick.

Facing a passed partner and with a bare king as part of his 13 HCP, South may jump to 3♠ over any opening from East, trying to shut out a possible contract the other way. If instead he bids 1♠ over 1♣/♦, North could do worse than to raise to 2♠, even with a doubleton. This would be routine with three low spades, and king-doubleton will often prove to be just as useful facing a vulnerable overcall, and it has the benefit of making a heart contract harder to reach for E/W.

East has a 2♣ opener and that will often earn his side a free run. He will rebid 2♠ over the 2♦ response and 3♠ over West’s next bid of 3♣ – a 7-4 hand should normally bid the seven-card suit twice before introducing the second suit. West may raise 3♠ to game and East will be very tempted to go on. If he just bids slam, he will go down on the normal diamond lead. If, on the other hand, he invites West to decide, West will probably not think that the bare king is enough on its own and will sign off in 5♠, just making.

South may come in over 2♣, particularly if he has a two-suited defence available to him. If he can show either the red suits or hearts and a minor, North can pre-empt to the five level, and East can only bid 5♠ under pressure. Will West bid six on the strength of his one good card?

Actually, 6♣/♠ are both decent contracts in theory – just not in practice – so anyone who gets there can consider themselves to be a little unlucky.

There are 12 tricks available on this perfect-fit hand but very few will bid to slam as it is hard to realise how good a contract 6♠ is. After all, it is only possession of the major-suit tens that makes it good.

South will open 1♠ and North respond 2NT, if playing some version of Jacoby and not the inferior Baron 2NT. It is much better to bid naturally at the three level and show splinters at the four level than vice-versa – this way around makes the splinters rather specific as they deny a second suit, and one can often show the side-suit at the three level then the splinter at opener’s next turn. Anyway, that means that South rebids 3♦. With a minimum game raise and no fitting diamond honour, North may just jump to game now, ending the auction. If he rebids 3♠ instead, South has room to show his singleton by bidding 4♣ (this should be specifically a shortage as South can bid 3NT to invite the start of cuebidding). That improves the North hand a lot, ace-to-three being almost the perfect holding facing a singleton. Still, having already bid 2NT and 3♠, he will be hard-pressed to find another forward-going bid, particularly as any cuebid would have to be beyond game.

Now the question is, will East bid 4♠, or will he assume that partner has fewer than four as he failed to bid 4♠ himself, in which case there is a case for bidding 5♣ instead? After all, East expects to get forced at the start, which could be awkward if partner does not have four spades.</p> <p>Despite these worries, most E/Ws will get to 4♠ and make 11 tricks for a solid +450, while +400 in 5♣ will score poorly. For the record, I would make the responsive double as West and bid 4♠ as East, being willing on the East cards to discard at trick two rather than ruff if necessary to retain trump control.</p>																																																					
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
