North is likely to pass at his second turn, as his hand has become a defensive one and he lacks the power for 1NT: 2♣ is a possibility but the suit should surely be longer or stronger. East might bid 1NT at this point, intending to protect with 2♠ if N/S keep the bidding open (as South would with 2♥). His alternative action is to raise to 2♠ defensively at the first opportunity, which can't be taken too seriously by partner as he would make an unassuming cue bid with a stronger hand.</p> <p>The hand plays well for South in 2♥, particularly if West starts with a give-away ♦A, so the trick is to go one down in 2♠ (even 2 down undoubled beats -110). There will be those who identify a heart fit, either via an opening which promises 20-22 high card points including a 5-card suit, or via the use of 5-card Stayman by North. Either 3NT or 4♥ can yield 12 tricks, thanks to the diamond position, provided South is declarer. Played by North on a spade lead, 4♥ is still OK for 11 tricks but 3NT offers only nine (though that’s the least likely of all outcomes).

Those who bid 6♥ by South will register a very lucky near-top, with 6NT taking all the match-points. However, despite the 5-card suit and all those good intermediates, any Norths who invite slam – and any Souths who accept the invitation – are risking a minus score, which is only justified if they are desperate for a good result. A maximum of 32 high card points in the two hands isn’t quite enough otherwise. Bearing this in mind, the key decision at match-points is whether to play in hearts or no-trumps.

South may have a weak 2♦ opening available, or West a 2-suited gadget, either of which will lead to a completely different auction. Otherwise, North has an awkward choice of opening bid – 2NT or whatever system dictates as a strong hand with long spades (opening 1♠ risks partner passing with game available). It matters little which choice is adopted, provided the end result isn’t a 4♠ contract (or, worse, 6♠).

As can be seen, the winning action is to reach 6♦, which needs only a 3-2 trump break to succeed. Getting there is another matter - perhaps North opens 2♣ and South decides he has enough to jump to 3♦? (unlikely) or North opens 2NT and South more or less bashes slam – in which case it had better be in diamonds!. So the big winner is 6♦ and next best (as so often) is 3NT.

The end result will always be 4♥ and it’s purely a matter of how you get there: an old-fashioned 1♥-3♥-4♥ or something like the auction above, where 2NT shows a high-card raise to at least 3♥, after which South might be reluctant to sign off immediately and mark time with either 3♠ or 3♦, neither of which will get him beyond game (hopefully).

The play is equally easy to predict: on any lead declarer can win, draw trumps and discard a spade on the third diamond winner, the kindly trump break allowing access to dummy for a spade towards the king and 11 tricks.

Anything other than +450 to N/S will be a slight surprise.

East might well consider himself worth a small flutter at his second turn with 3♠ or a more clear-cut 4♣ but partner surely won't be interested in slam even then. Some Souths will no doubt consider taking action with such good shape but the vulnerability is discouraging. Ten tricks are possible in diamonds so 5♦* is a theoretical save against 4♥: this only works if E/W take limited money but they are perhaps more likely to push on to 5♥ painlessly and 6♦ would finally prove too costly.</p> <p>+450 to E/W will surely be the popular score, all things considered, though one or two Souths might just emerge a hero with -200. In any case, 1NT describes the point count and shape better. 1NT can be held to seven tricks, provided South ducks hearts twice, and that would represent a good score for N/S. It's very doubtful whether he'd get into the auction now. Yet his side has a comfortable ten tricks available in hearts, thanks to the spade finesse and kindly diamond position.</p> <p>However, if the bidding starts as shown above, South will do very well to avoid pushing E/W into game or suffering a penalty in 5♣, though 4♣ might just buy the contract for a small minus. This is a pig of a hand for N/S if their opponents are playing weak jump overcalls (as most do these days). If a double of 2♠ is for penalties North would certainly consider it (though it's a bit thin and only to be contemplated at pairs). Otherwise – given that double is usually for TO - he has a nasty choice between pass and 3♣. After a pass it's anyone's guess as to what might happen but +50 for one down would look poor on the traveller. It's just possible that East might decide to push the boat out with 3♠, in which case a penalty double now would score well. After a simple 1♠ overcall North is sure to bid 1NT, leading to a likely part score in clubs.

Actually, it's a pig of a hand anyway, in the sense that N/S have an easy 3NT thanks to the magic lie of the cards. Anyone who bids it deserves his top for derring-do alone but that seems unlikely, so N/S scores are more likely to vary between +300, +130, +100 and +50. Annoying!

This will be a popular auction leading to an easy 11 tricks unless North is sufficiently inspired to find a spade lead (or to an unlikely 12 if North opts for a diamond and declarer has the courage to run it). Ten tricks in 4♥ is sure to score quite poorly.

There will be those who bash 3NT either directly or via an enquiry as to opener's trump quality. They will be rewarded with a minimum return of 630 (660 without a spade lead). However, East has to have sufficient confidence in partnership methods to insist on no-trumps: otherwise, if there is a hole in hearts, a spade lead could be horribly damaging, in theory.

Without a weak two opening being available, game in hearts or no-trumps is available to E/W just as easily, so it's likely to be the determined pairs specialists who top the charts.

The auction shown above is far from cast in stone: firstly, does East open 1♥ or a weak 2♥? There is a case for either. Whatever is chosen, does South overcall in spades with such a modest suit or double first? These days many expert tournament players make simple overcalls at the one-level on quite strong hands, though the traditional method is to double and then bid a suit to show a hand too strong for the original overcall. Then again, how many hearts does West bid at his turn? Surely 4♥ at least if partner has opened a weak 2♥, otherwise the size of the pre-empt is a matter for partnership style. It would seem that N/S should always find their way to 4♠, against which only the staidest of opponents would fail to save in 5♥. That's the biggest test of all if it arises because South has the chance to ruin everything by bidding on: it's very unlucky that there are three unavoidable losers. There'll be a few sorry red faces here, I fancy.

Such fiddly little boards can play a large part in the destination of pairs tournaments. There is clearly a case for West passing 1♠ out but aggressive players rarely heed such advice (and probably gain on balance). There is equally a case for East passing the 2♠ raise (which is preferred to a 1NT response on grounds of the ruffing value) but that could be silly if partner is topside for his bid. It must also be pointed out that if E/W adopt a passive approach, N/S are unlikely to defend at the one level and, once they intervene, they have an excellent chance of locating their heart fit. This will push E/W into 2♠ in some auctions, where they should scramble home.

So in sum, E/W can gain a small plus from defending 2♥, a comparatively major plus from making 2♠ or a small minus from going overboard in 2NT. The big prize is reserved for anyone bold enough to get 200 from 2♥ doubled!

With four relatively Cautious Cuthberts around the table this will be a frequent auction and the number of tricks achieved will vary considerably: the maximum, double-dummy, is nine but that depends on dropping the bare ♠K, which seems unlikely to say the least, unless South has entered the bidding and declarer can judge at some stage that he’s therefore overwhelmingly likely to hold that card.

Many Souths will have a system bid to protect over 1NT and some will be unable to resist the temptation to use it, arguing that the vulnerability is in their favour: this is something of a false assumption (a penalty is a penalty at any vulnerability and is likely to outscore anything available from a part score). Here, for example, an aggressive E/W combination can reap a rich harvest if West simply relies on his side’s known superior point-count.

Another excellent pairs hand offering a variety of results – some of them dramatic.

West’s opening bid will be venturesome for some of us, routine for others. The 2♠ rebid will be through gritted teeth. When East game forces with 3♦, some Wests will use a “fast-arrival” 5♦ bid in preference to an apparently encouraging 4♦: it’s a matter of agreed partnership style in some sense but, in the context of seeing things through, 4♦ is a sensible option – remember that he’s already shown a minimum opening, has four good trumps, an ace-king and hopefully a now useful ♥J. Over the alternative 5♦ bid, East has to shut his eyes and bid one for the road.

So will 6♦ win all the match-points? Perhaps not quite: it will certainly score well but the big winner will be anyone who prefers 6♥ – naughty but nice!

This board should represent a reasonably untroubled episode after the stressful slam-bidding exercise just passed (or not!) The auction might be curtailed if West prefers a direct 2♠ raise to 1NT. South will be chafing at the bit with those strong hearts and 14 high card points but, in all honesty, what can he do? – to double for take-out and hear a 2♣ response from partner would leave him even more frustrated.

A spade part score is certainly the top spot for E/W, with nine tricks looking possible and ten not impossible if all goes well and/or the defence slips slightly. Leading the a first round of trumps from dummy carries an important premium in that the ace beats thin air. It’s not clear that this will always transpire, however, when the defence starts with two rounds of hearts, so +110 will feature occasionally on the traveller.

Hands up all those who bid 2♠ over the opening 1NT! Ouch! This might be a winning action on some occasions but is odds-against otherwise. East’s hand is primarily defensive: how much more comfortable it will feel on occasion to lead ♠K against 1NT, rather than toil in 2♠ (whether doubled or not) opposite an unsuitable dummy!

It might seem superficially that after an initial pass and a transfer to 2♥, 2♠ is now somehow a safer action. But that’s not so: the South hand is still unlimited and may well have an axe poised. The key to it all, despite the robust trumps, is the lack of a sixth spade: it’s that that makes the difference so often between a playable and an unplayable spot.

Here the proof of the pudding is that N/S are unlikely to make a heart contract, and E/W are equally unlikely to make one in spades. QED.

1♥ is the best opening bid available to West (anything stronger is fraught with danger). We have seen a number of hands recently where responder has to decide between a 1NT response and a direct raise with only 3-card support: in truth there’s no hard-and-fast rule to help (certainly a direct 2♥ here would by no means be a mistake). 2♥ would shorten the auction whilst 1NT requires partner to make a game-forcing rebid (or risk missing game) on something of a wing and a prayer. All is well, however, when East confesses to 3-card heart support: 4♥ looks the right option, rather than 3♥ which could be through gritted teeth, and describes this ace-less collection well.

4♥ plays comfortably – provided declarer makes the standard safety-play of a low trump towards the jack. Otherwise, ouch!
