The June edition and the past five editions have all relevant web links enabled so members can click to go directly to any site mentioned. In addition, page numbers can be clicked on, so members can visit that page. From the June online issue onwards members will see additional content too.

In addition to the more modern magazines, the EBU are also delighted to announce that the first ever EBU magazine is available to read too. What is Bridge?

Bridge is a trick-taking card game of skill and chance. It is played by four players who form two partnerships (sides); the partners sit opposite each other at a table. The game consists of the auction (often called bidding) and play, after which the hand is scored.
