Pat and Tony added "After the club had the foresight to introduce online bridge, it has proved a lifeline for us; an opportunity to stay close to our friends, and make new ones, by playing online bridge both socially and competitively."

Online bridge has no geographical boundaries and Gayle and Colin have particularly enjoyed being able to play with bridge playing friends from other parts of the UK – and have even been able to join friends in Australia for a game online.

Sarah Miller playing with Margaret Donkin, Ralph Bell and Hazel Wootton are seen here having a fun time on the Realbridge online platform! Sarah, said "these team events are great fun. You could describe it as speed dating meets online Bridge (not that she had tried the

former she hastened to add!) It's terrific to see there are so many people around the country enjoying the game as much as me!



The spin off has not only been the chance to play a great game with friends in Lockdown but also has given many elderly folks confidence to use technology for zoom calls, shopping, and other necessary activities.

The take up of on-line Bridge has been incredibly popular and it was not long before Warminster Bridge Club moved from two to three sessions a week including a supervised play session for beginners every Monday morning.

Gillian said: "I like the scope for playing whenever free to do so. Online bridge has been a saviour in lockdown."

Marianne from Frome added: "I don't drive at night now and prior to Lockdown I had to rely on friends to take me to the Warminster Bridge Club. I am now able to play online without leaving my own home. I am certainly glad to have the opportunity to play independently as contact with other people is so important"
