I commented in yesterday's bulletin that I had not spotted the way to make 4s on this deal. As I suggested, I just had a blind spot and was looking for a totally different solution to the correct one. Ben Green was the first to point out the solution.

The way to make 4s is to win the likely diamond lead and play a spade. South will win and returna red card. Declarer wins and cashes the top hearts then plays two more winning spades but then, rather than draw the last trump, leads the $\$ 3$ to throw North in with his $\$$.

North is now forced to give dummy either two heart tricks or lead a club, giving dummy a club and one heart. Either way, the trump trick given away comes back double and declarer has ten tricks.

One pair who overcame the bad trump split on Board 16 were Gillian Weatherly and Francis Glassbarrow. They sailed into $6 \vee$ after Glassbarrow had used Stayman then, on finding a heart fit, RKCB. The $5 \triangleleft$ response showed two key cards but denied the queen of hearts.

Weatherly received the lead of the jack of spades, which she won in hand and immediately made the correct technical play of a low heart to the queen. When the four-zero split came to light, she could see that there would be two trump losers unless she could arrange an endplay so set about the side suits.

Weatherly played three rounds of diamonds, ruffing, then ace of spades and ruffed a spade. Finally, she crossed her fingers and cashed three rounds of clubs. at the end of all that she had only PAJ8 and North SKI09. A low club ruff forced North to over-ruff but then he was endplayed to lead into the $\subset A J$ at trick twelve.

## Triple Underlead

Bridge teachers usually tell us otherwise, but is it OK to underlead a side-suit ace against a trump contract? One of my favourite deals from the recent ACBL Nationals in Chicago featured just such a play.

Board 8. Dealer West. None Vul.


I did not like my options very much on lead to 4 §. It sounded as though East/West might be missing a diamond control or, if they did have one, it might be that there would be a king-jack guess in dummy. Accordingly, I led the $\diamond 3$, not being particularly happy when this went to the four, ten and king.

Declarer was looking for dummy entries to take trump finesses so led a low club to my bare king.In tempo, I led a second low diamond to the eight, jack and ruff. Declarer thought he could see two entries to dummy now so he crossed to the king of spades to lead a low heart to his nine. Now he was in some trouble as I scooped in the jack, the only problem being that I was now endplayed. If I exited with a heart or a spade, I would pick up that suit for declarer, while the ace of diamonds would be ruffed, establishing dummy's queen. Declarer could then play ace and queen of hearts, losing to the king but taking the rest for ten tricks.

So I led the $\diamond 9$, my third underlead of the ace, and, sure enough, declarer played low from the dummy. He ruffed in hand and tried to cash the ace then queen of spades - and the roof fell in. North, Paul Hackett,ruffed, gave me a club ruff, over-ruffed the fourth spade and gave me a second club ruff. The defence never made a diamond trick, but came to five trump tricks and the K for down three.

I was endplayed at trick one. If I started with the $\diamond$ A, what would I lead at trick two? A second diamond gives declarer an entry to finesse in
hearts, a club tips declarer off regarding the position in that suit, and a heart or a spade picks up that suit. Maybe it is OK to underlead a side-suit ace after all?

Declarer plays the ace of hearts - four, eight and nine, then the king of spades to partner's ace, four and nine. Partner returns the $\diamond 7$ to the jack, queen and three.
